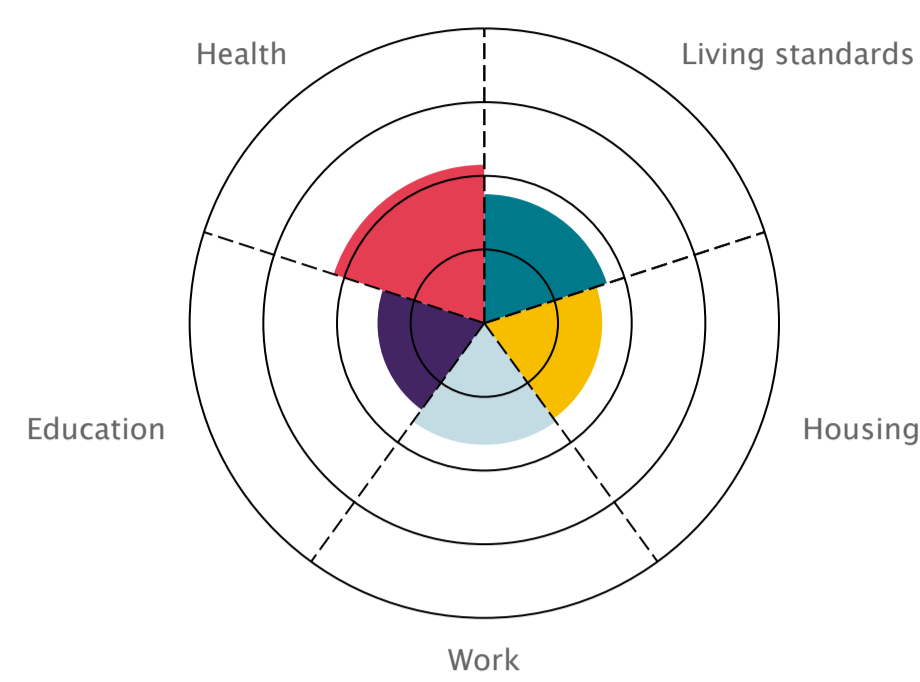

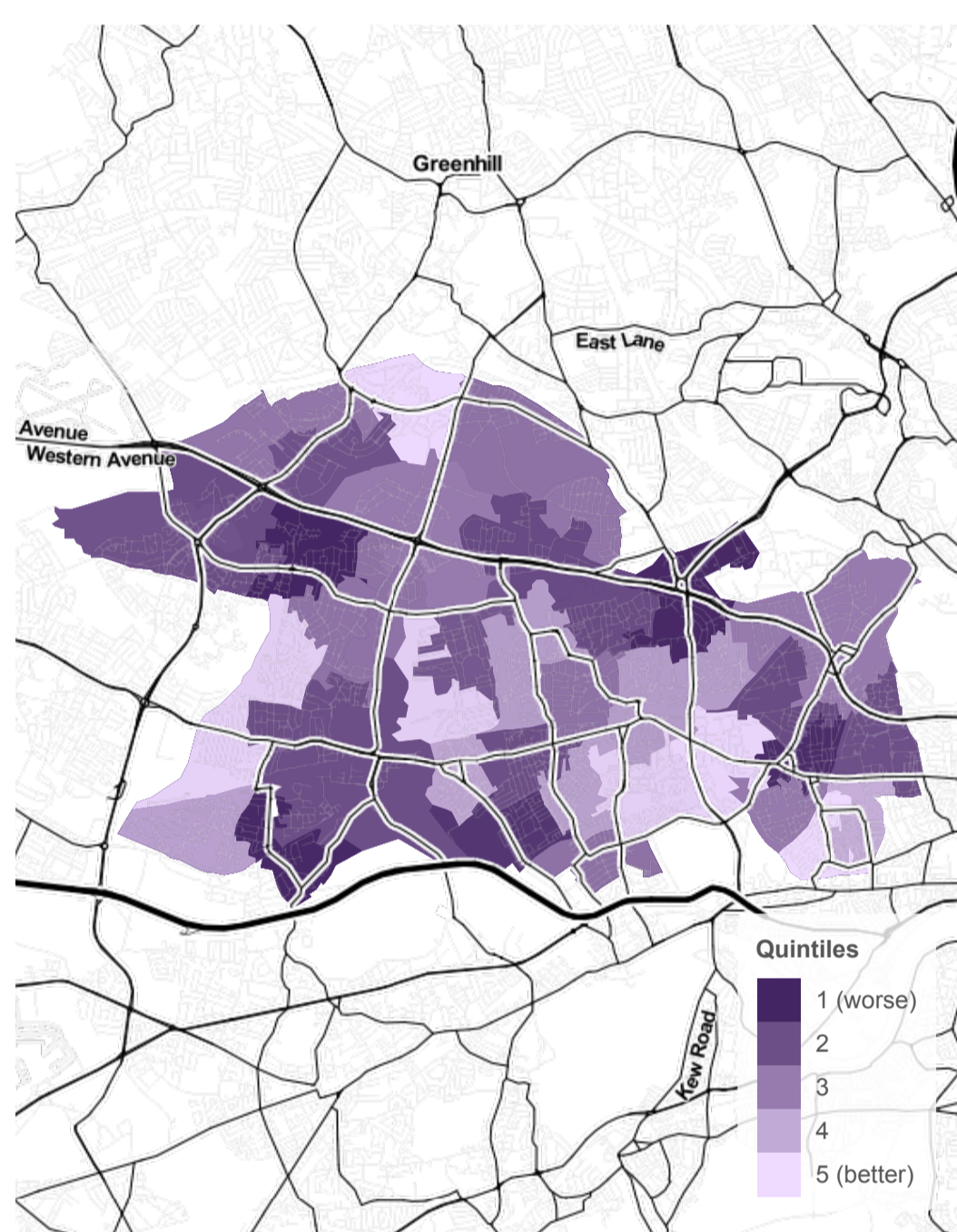


The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

Key Points

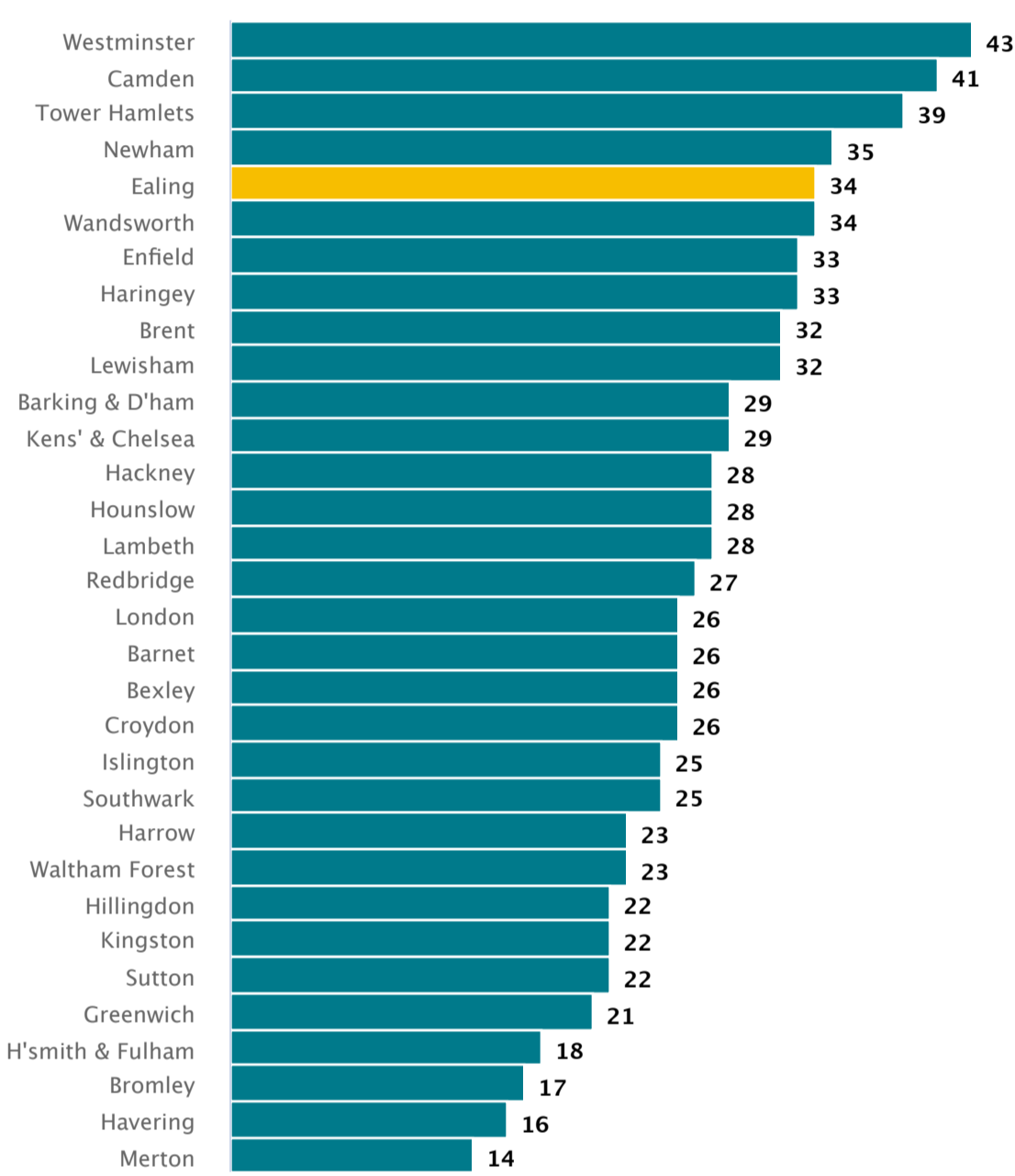
- In 2021/22, 34% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 32% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Ealing, 18.5% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2022. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- GCSE attainment was better than the average London Borough in Ealing, with 76.7% of students achieving grades 9-4 (A*-C under the old grading system) in GCSE English and Maths in 2021/22
- Unemployment change in 2023 Q1 at -1.8 percentage points from 3 years ago was around the same as the average London Borough.
- The unemployment rate for 2023 Q1 was 5.3% in Ealing, around the same as the average London Borough.
- There were 3.51 repossessions by county court bailiffs per 1,000 in Ealing in 2022 Q2 - 2023 Q1, worse than the average London Borough.

Income estimates 2018



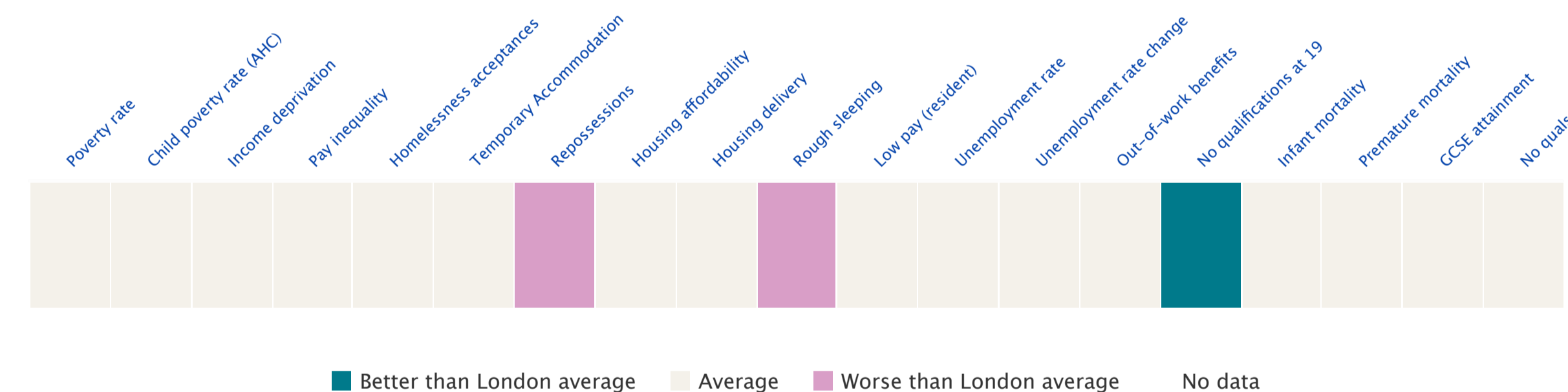

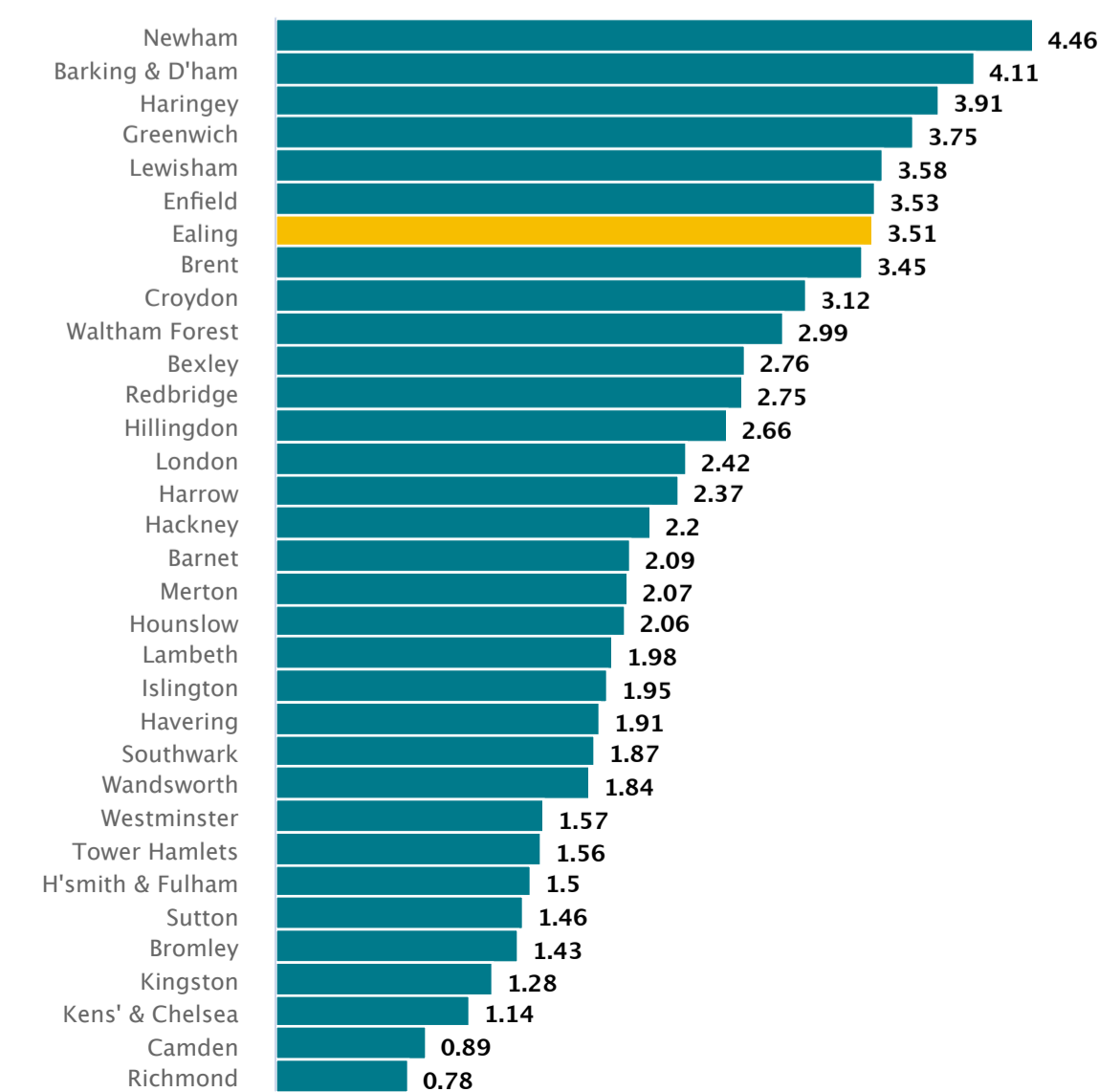
Ealing ratings across key indicators



Looking across all the indicators collected at Borough level for the London Poverty Profile, Ealing did worst for Total repossessions by county court bailiffs in London boroughs, and best for GCSE attainment - grades 9-4 in English and Maths by London borough.

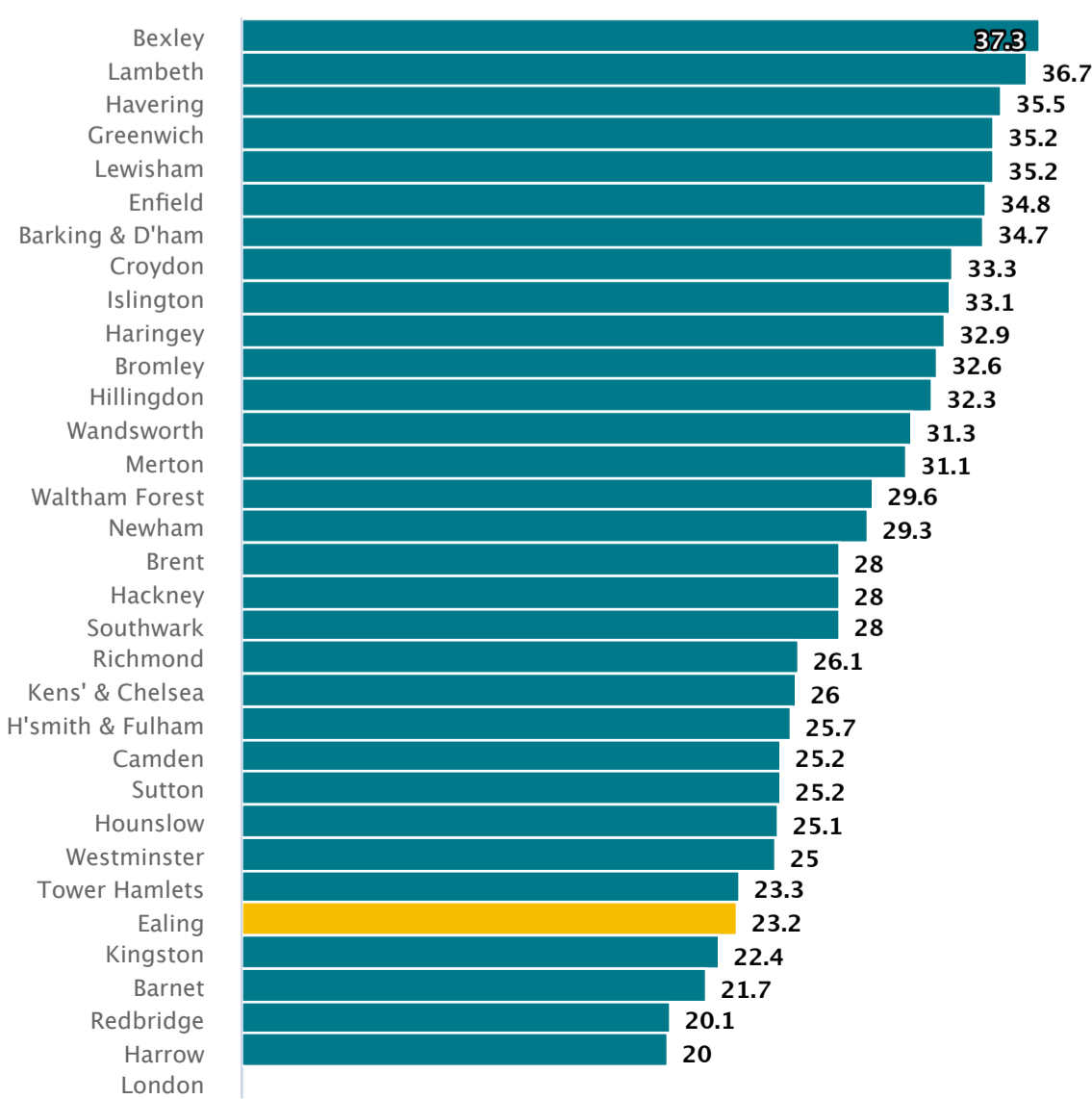
Repossessions per 1,000 households 2022 Q2 - 2023 Q1
