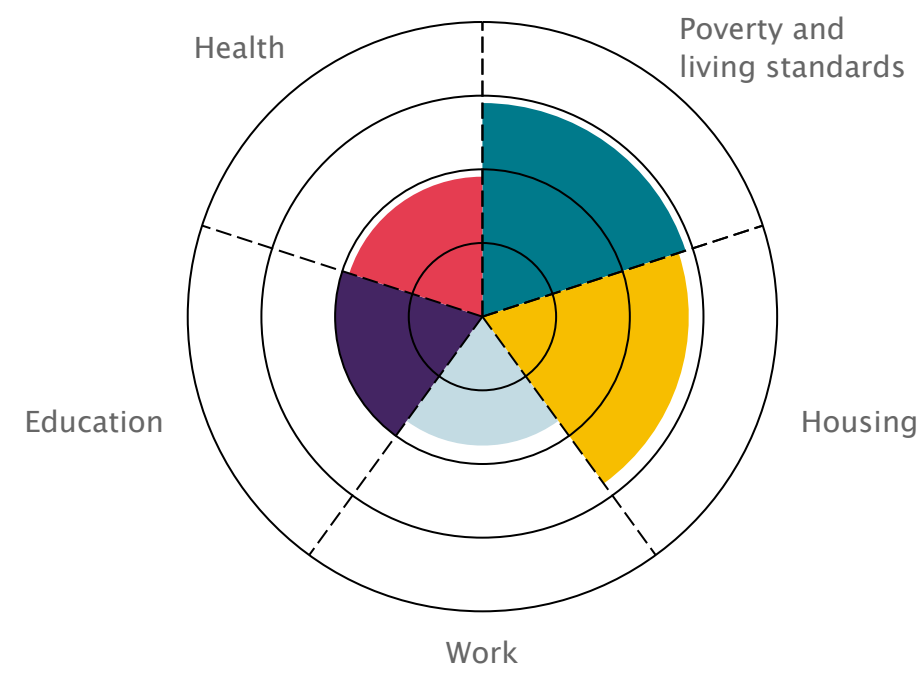

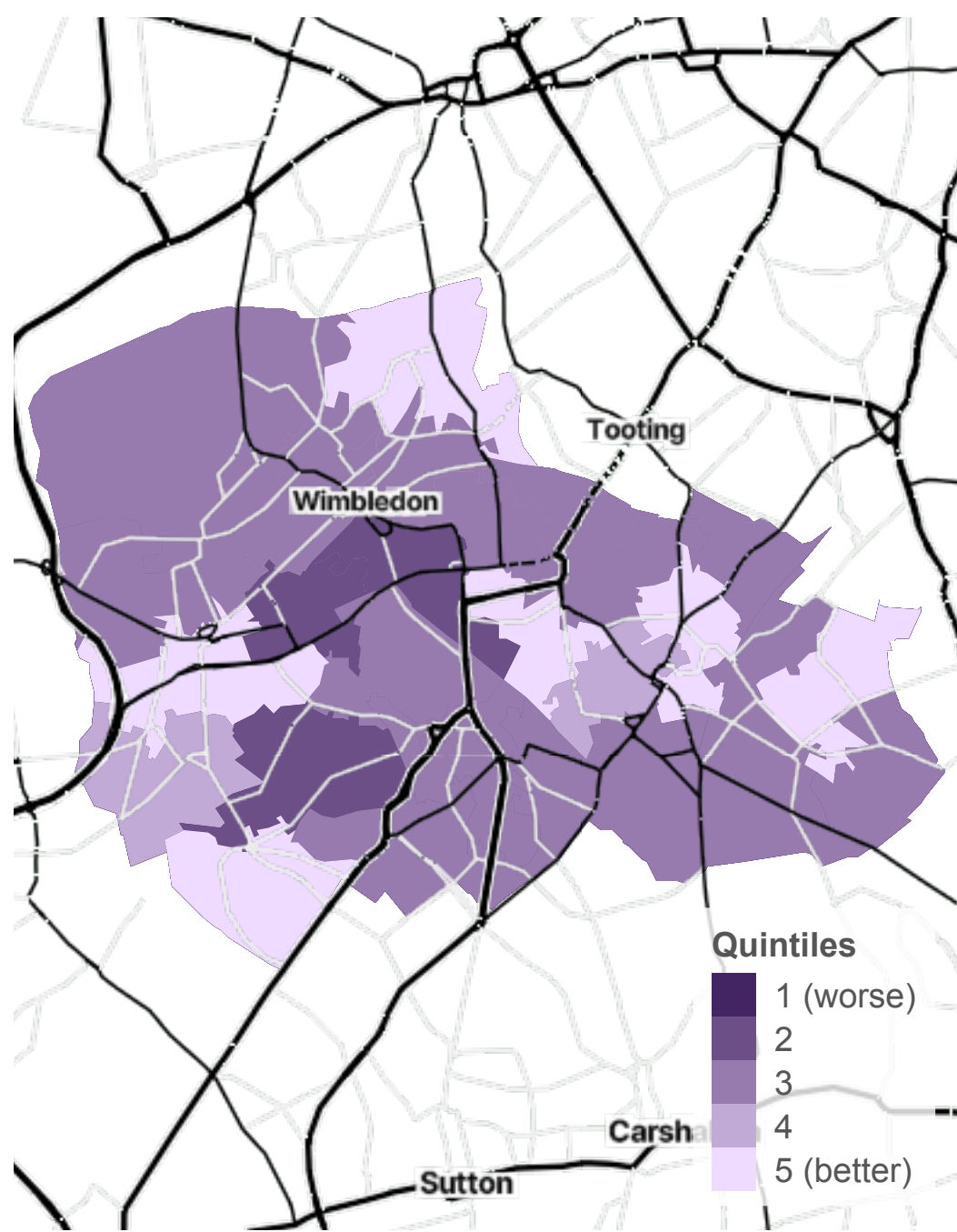
Key Points

- In 2022/23, 15% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was better than the average London Borough.
- 27% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2022/23. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Merton, 13% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2024. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 2.3% of adults in the borough had no recognised qualifications in 2021. This was better than the average London Borough.
- Affordable, social and other discounted housing completions were around the same as in Merton the average London Borough, with 174 delivered in 2020/21 - 2022/23.
- Infant mortality rates per 1,000 live births in Merton were around the same as the average London Borough at 4.4 in 2022



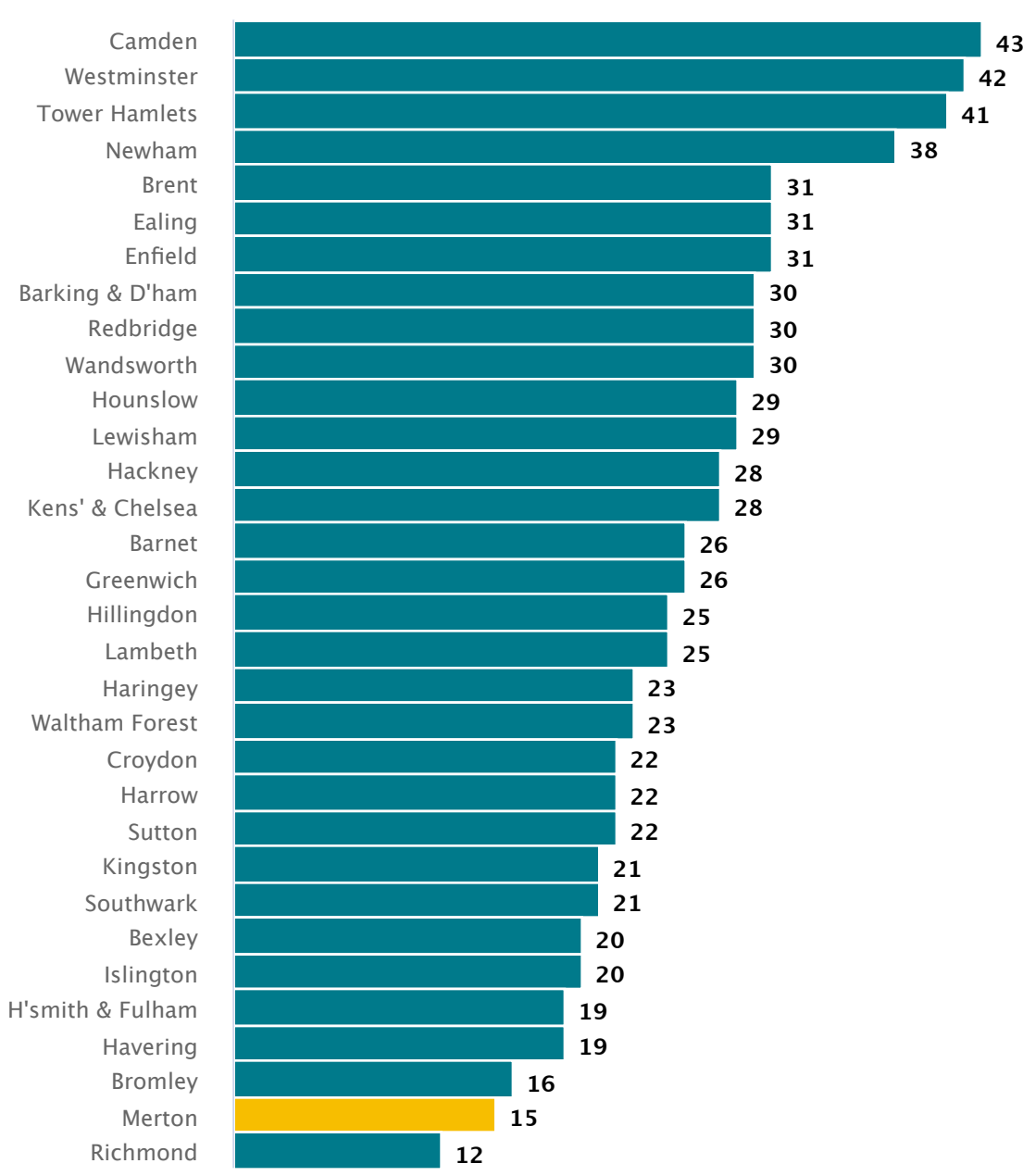
The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

Income estimates 2020



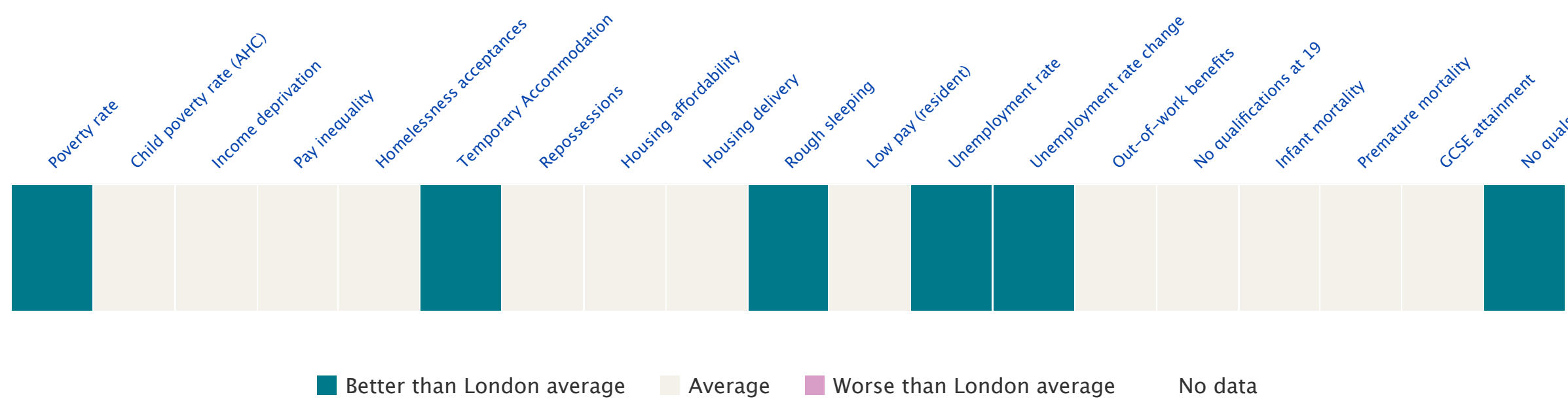

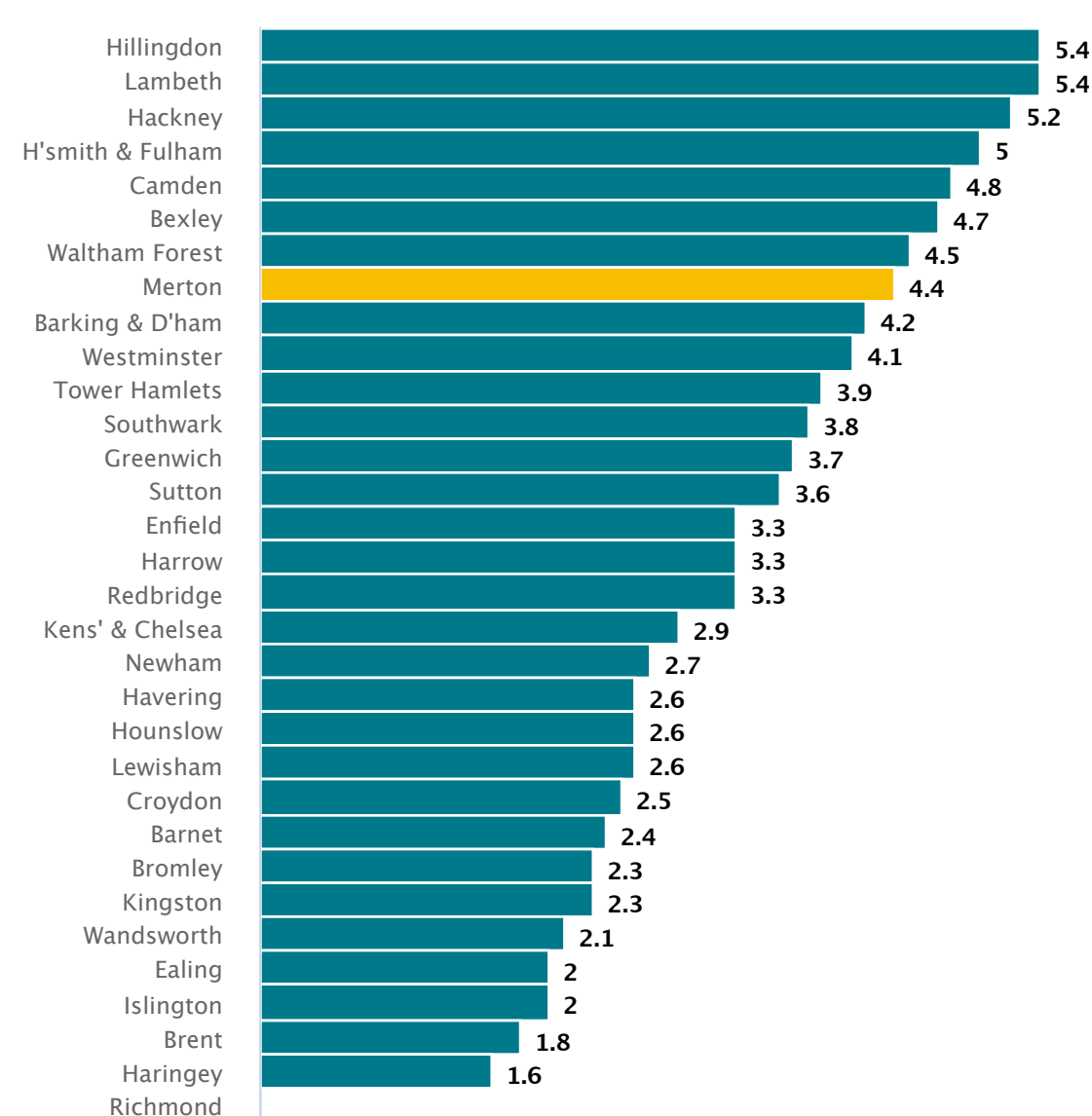
Merton ratings across key indicators

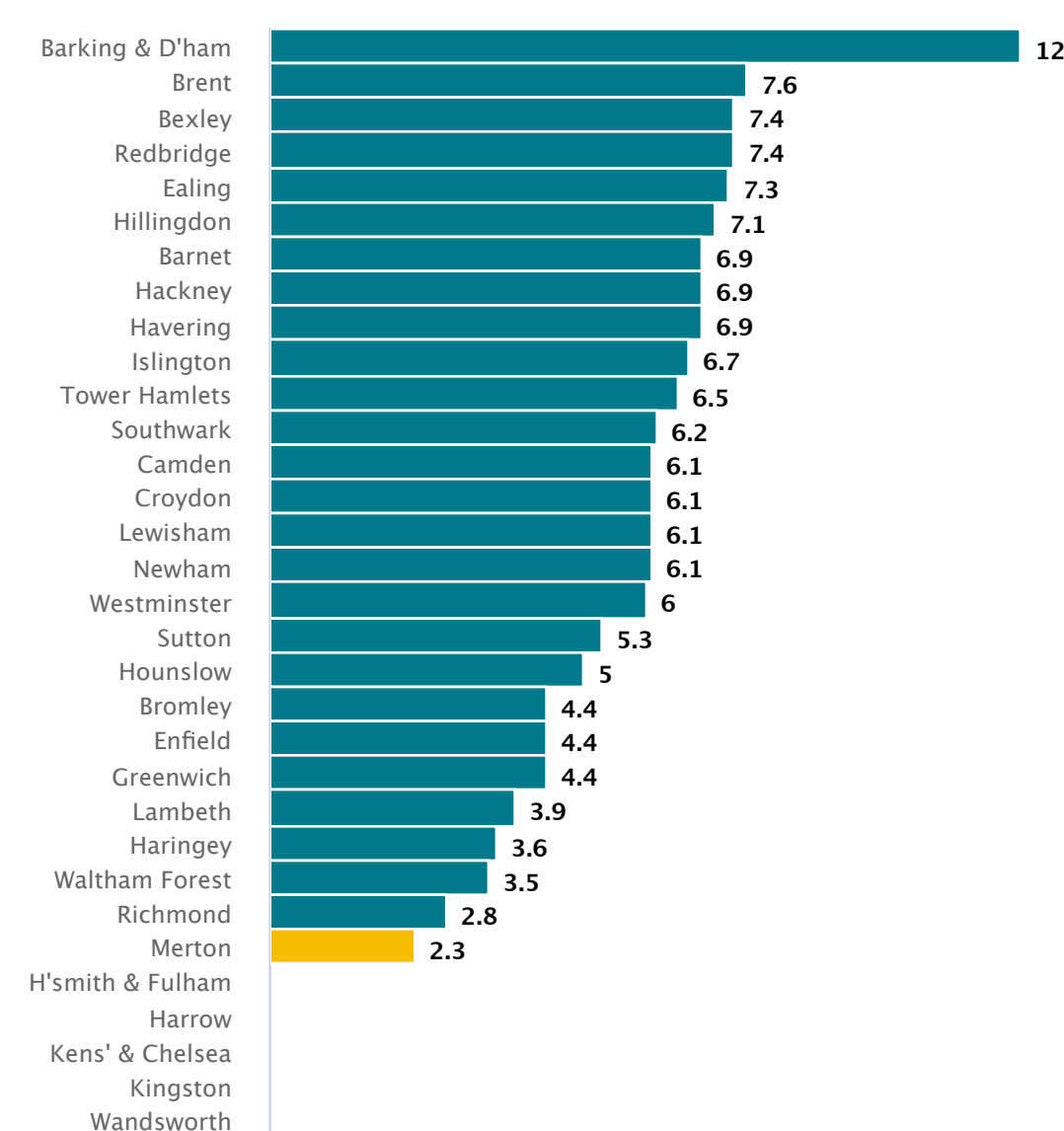
Infant mortality rate per 1,000 live births 2022
